Alzheimer's disease is the most common cause of dementia. American Indians and Veterans carry a higher risk for the disease than the general population. While scientists know these differences in risk exist, they do not know why. The Alzheimer's Disease Research Center Clinical Core was established to help scientists better understand Alzheimer's disease.

What is the purpose of this study?

The purpose of the Clinical Core study is to help researchers identify people at risk for Alzheimer's disease earlier and find better ways to prevent and treat Alzheimer's disease and related memory disorders.

Why volunteer?

To help find a way to delay or prevent Alzheimer's disease for future generations.


What does being a participant involve?

- Attend no-cost study visits, either annually or every other year
- Undergo memory and thinking abilities evaluations
- Identify a study partner who can come with you to study visits and answer questions about your memory and daily life. This can be a friend, relative, or caregiver you interact with on a regular basis.

Participants will receive \$75 for regular study visits and up to \$175 for biomarker visits.

- Diagnosis of dementia due to Alzheimer's disease
- Age 45–65 with or without a parental history of Alzheimer's disease
